1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Anchal College, Padampur is situated in the Western part of Odisha in the district of Bargarh at 21 Degree North (Latitude) and 83 Degree East (Longitude). The revenue sub-division of Padampur is bordered by Nawapara District on West, Bolangir District on South, State of Chhattisgarh on NorthEast and the Gandhamardan Hill range of epic fame on SouthWest. The Gandhamardan has a tropical dry deciduous forest and is a repository of more than 200 rare medicinal herbs.

This region is known to be an economically underdeveloped region of Odisha. For majority of its population, agriculture is the chief means of subsistence which depends on the vagaries of rainfall. The area lacks major irrigation projects and industries which account for the economic backwardness of this region. The aspiring youths in the past could hardly afford to pursue higher educational institutions far away from Padampur. The establishment of Anchal College, Padampur in 1965 was a noble venture to fill the void.

Spread over a picturesque campus, this institution, at the time of its inception, stood as a beacon with in a radius of 80kms, undertaking the responsibility of liberating people from bondage of poverty, illiteracy and superstition, the very motto envisaged in the emblem "Sa Vidya Ya Vimuktaye". Thanks to relentless effort of the people of this locality, the constant and consistent endeavour of the members of the staff and exemplary sense of discipline of the industrious students, this institution has carved a niche for itself in the academic structure of the state of Odisha.

The College was initially affiliated to Utkal University up to P. U. classes in Humanities in 1965. After the establishment of Sambalpur University in 1966, the college got affiliated to it and open degree classes in Arts, Science stream commenced from 1968-69 session and commerce teaching started rather late, in 2000-01. At present Honours teaching facilities in all major subjects are available in the college.

The college was recognized by UGC and was included under section 2f and 12B of UGC in 1979 and continued to receive various grants from UGC till the 12th Five year plan. Subsequently it was included under RUSA and received a grant of Rupees Two Crores.

The college has already completed two cycles of NAAC assessment and accredited with grade B. The preparation for the third cycle of assessment got delayed by a few months due to the pandemic.

Vision

The vision of the College is:

- To promote the cause of higher education in Padampur sub-division by just and proper management of College and initiating and implementing projects for the improvement of the college.

Mission

The mission of the College behind the aforesaid vision are:

- To inculcate social, moral, ethical and democratic values among the rural youth through access to higher education.
- To ignite the young mind so as to make them instruments of social and economic changes.
- To develop scientific awareness in the area plagued by poverty, illiteracy and superstitions.
- To pursue in letter and spirit the motto incorporated in our emblem “Sa Vidya Ya Vimuktaye” which means education liberates us from bondages.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

Strengths:

- The institution has, to a great extent, been successful in its mission of bringing about an awakening in social, political and cultural life of this region, traditionally dubbed as the most backward area of the state.
- The college has established itself as one of the oldest lead colleges of Odisha with good name and fame. It has succeeded in its mission of promoting the cause of higher education in a backward region of the state.
- It is well known in its affiliating university and the state at large for maintaining its disciplined academic ambience through the last fifty five years.
- It has a good reputation for its exemplary system of holding examinations.
- The college caters well to student diversity and attracts good number of students from neighbouring districts of Nuapada, Kalahandi, Bolangir and Sonepur in addition to its own district of Bargarh.
- Participation of students, teachers, guardians and public in engagement of academia is inspiring and positive.
- The college has a vast area of land for future expansion.
- The student-teacher ratio is comfortable.

Institutional Weakness

Weaknesses:

- The region lacks irrigation and industry and is mainly domiciled by tribal and backward people. Students hailing from such a socio-economic backdrop usually hesitate to opt for self-financing courses which is the call of the day.
- Institutional support is not congenial to open new courses without financial assistance from the

government.

- The rate of infrastructural growth of the institution has been slow.
- Institutional support to mediocre students for their academic development leading to job opportunities is minimum.
- Research base in the institution needs development
- Institutional professionalism is not up to the mark
- Though the institution has a strong Alumni base both in India and abroad, it has failed to generate significant funds from alumni contribution.
- The functioning of Higher Secondary wing inside the college premises dampens the activities of UG programme.

Institutional Opportunity

- Being a multidisciplinary college with vast area of land, it has the potential to develop into a large Higher Educational Institution with a cluster of small colleges in its periphery as envisaged in the NEP – 2020.
- It has the opportunity to open Vocational courses which are area-specific leading to job opportunities for the students.
- There is scope for introduction of courses such as Performing Arts, Dryland Farm Techniques, Solar power installation, Instrumentation in Electrical and Electronics.
- A number of students can have success in various competitive examinations with suitable guidance and support of the institution.

Institutional Challenge

- As the managing committee of the college is firm in its resolve to keep the capitation fee affordable for all in order to provide access to higher education to the Socio-economically backward youths of the region, it is a challenge for the institution to generate funds from external sources such as: alumni, altruistic citizens, MP/MLA LAD fund and other Govt. / Non-Govt. agencies.
- Unless timely preventive measures are taken we apprehend the stereotyped institutions imparting teaching in traditional courses may liquidate and create a bleak future for the posterity.
- The research base in the institution needs to be strengthened.
- Institutional professionalism needs to be honed to keep up with the contemporary demands and to sustain in the race of modern education.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college offers Honours teaching in 07 (Seven) core subjects in Arts (Economics, Education, English, History, Odia, Philosophy, Political Science), 05 (Five) core subjects of Science (Botany, Chemistry, Mathematics, Physics, Zoology) and Accountancy in Commerce based on the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). Besides the core subjects, students opt for their electives from a diverse pool of subjects. Students of all stream are imparted teaching in Compulsory subjects that include Communicative English, Environmental Studies and Disaster Management, Ethics and Values and Quantitative and Logical Thinking. The college has

moved the Govt. for opening of Computer Science with 32 seats since 2019 which is under the active consideration of the Higher Education Department.

Being an affiliated college, the college follows the syllabus prescribed by Sambalpur University. However, many senior faculties contribute in the syllabus designing of the University as members of Board of Studies. At present the state model syllabus with clearly stated learning outcomes, course outcomes and programme outcomes framed by the Odisha State Higher Education Council (OSHEC) and approved by Sambalpur University has been adopted by the college.

To ensure academic excellence the college has provision for an academic audit by a committee consisting of HODs with the Principal as the chairman. One Academic Bursar is appointed from among the senior faculties to monitor the academic affairs and suggest remedial measures.

The curriculum delivery is made effective and efficacious through the framework of preparation of academic calendar, time-table, and maintenance of lesson plan and progress register. The Academic Committee, IQAC, Staff Council and HODs regularly contribute in planning, implementation and monitoring academic affairs.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Admission to the degree courses is done online through the SAMS (Student Academic Management System) portal. The process of admission is solely based on merit and in accordance with the reservation policies prescribed by the Govt. for SC/ST/OBC/Divyanga and other special categories of students. The merit list and cut off marks in each phase of admission are displayed on the website to ensure transparency.

It makes us proud that the college is one of the most coveted colleges of this region. Further it is gratifying to note that the institution caters to the need of the lower strata of the society and more than 80% of the students admitted belong to SC/ST/OBC category as is evident from the student profile.

The traditional teacher-centred lecture method of teaching is supplemented by learner-centric activities like symposia, group discussion, debates, field visit, project works. Each department has a seminar society with a student secretary coordinating the seminar activities of the department. Such activities are intended to inculcate communication skill, problem solving skill and leadership qualities among the students. The faculties assess the learning ability and skill of the students in order to provide special attention to slow learners and encourage advanced learners. Tutorial and proctorial classes are held for discussion, timely feedback and preparation of assignments.

Teachers frequently make use of projector, smart class room, and computer laboratory for the purpose of teaching. Access to internet is easily available in the college and students and teachers alike make the use of internet as a learning resource to download study materials.

The teachers are recruited by the Govt. through selection by Service Selection Board. Thanks to the regular recruitment made by Govt. the staff position of the institution has improved over the years and comfortable as of now, there are 52 permanent faculties out of whom 11 teachers have Ph. D. degrees. One of our teachers namely Dr Balaram Pradhan has received fellowship to undertake higher research for two years at National Institute of Health (NIH), USA for two years to undertake higher research which is a rare achievement for any Non-govt Degree College of the state. The college is keen on updating the knowledge and skill of the teachers and encourages them to undertake research, participate in refresher courses, workshops and seminars.

The performance of the faculty is assessed through self-appraisal, students' feedback and academic audit. The principal personally conveys the result of evaluation to the concerned teachers with necessary suggestions.

Students' performance is assessed through internal examination conducted by the Honours Departments and the centralized midterm examination conducted by the examination cell of the college. Performance of students is continuously monitored by the proctors. The college has the rare distinction of producing University Rank Holders in different subjects almost every year.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Since the college provides teaching at the UG level, there is limited scope for pursuing higher research. However, many faculties are actively engaged in research work and publishing research papers at regular intervals. There is a Biophysics and Biochemistry Laboratory to motivate staff and students to carry on interdisciplinary research and avail facilities for experimentation and innovations.

The college encourages the faculties to submit research proposals and carry on research activities. The managing committee has allowed two years study leave with full protection of pay to one of the faculties to pursue post-doctoral research at NIH, USA.

The students and staff of the college have always been conscious of their responsibility towards the community and carry on social activities both independently and in collaboration with Govt organizations. The NSS units, after a thorough survey, **have adopted three villages** and carry on **need-based extension activities** round the year. The Youth Red Cross Unit is actively engaged in conducting **Blood Donation Camps** and **Health Awareness Programmes**. The NCC unit of the college renders commendable service to people during natural calamities. The NSS, NCC, YRC and faculty members undertake **Plantation programmes, Swachhata Pakhwada** and Awareness programmes.

The college has collaboration with **BMN College of Home Science, Mumbai** and **National College, Nuapada** for sharing of ideas and experiences. Student and faculty exchange with BMN College is long awaited and was hindered by COVID pandemic.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Set amidst an eco-friendly atmosphere with hundreds of timber yielding plants like valuable matured Teak and other shady trees, our campus accommodates Principal's Office, Administrative Section, Examination Section, Science Departments with their laboratories, Computer Room, Botanical Garden and 30 classrooms. We have Principal's Residence, Staff Quarters, separate Common Rooms for faculties, boys and girls, a spacious Library, two hostels each for boys and girls, a canteen, two open air pandals, a badminton court and a playground.

The College library, from a modest beginning has grown considerably, housing at present approximately 30,000 odd books. It has got Book bank, a good number of reference books, Internet facility, Reprographic facility and Reading rooms for students and staff. The Library has been automated with e-Granthalaya Digital Platform to facilitate the growing academic requirement of the users.

Since +2 stream is not delinked from degree colleges in Odisha, the existing infrastructure is also used for

imparting teaching at that level. Besides the normal academic activities the infrastructure is utilised during vacations for conducting Private BA and MA Examinations, for IGNOU and OSOU study centres. Our premises are also used as Valuation Zones of CHSE and Sambalpur University.

The Computer Centre, with Internet connection is open to students and staff to facilitate them in the Teaching Learning process. The regular office work is duly supported by computerised service. The Science Department have their own computers catering to the needs of the students in preparation and dissemination of study materials.

Keeping in view the physical development of the students, the college, in addition to the playground has infrastructure for the games like badminton, table tennis and volleyball etc. An indoor stadium with facilities for games, gymnasium and yoga is presently under construction. The college canteen, as old as the college itself, caters to the refreshment needs of the students and staff.

Student Support and Progression

A substantial number of students passing out from this college go in for higher studies in the universities inside and outside the state.

The College has a students' union constituted by elected students' representatives. Besides the union, other associations such as Athletic Association, Dramatic Association, Odia Sahitya Sansad, Science Society, and Commerce Society have also elected Secretaries and representatives. Each department has seminar secretary who plays a lead role in coordinating and conducting seminar activities. These students' representatives not only participate and execute their duties but also contribute significantly in the democratic process and in organising several functions.

Alumni of this institution have occupied prominent position at the state, national and international level. **“MO COLLEGE ABHIYAN”** launched by the state government to connect the Alumni with their Alma Mater has been initiated. The Alumni have made notable contribution in successfully organizing the **Golden Jubilee Celebration** of the College.

Proctorial system has been implemented to monitor the academic progress of the students under the guidance of the teacher-proctors.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The Institutional mission of promotion of Higher Education in the socio-economically backward sub-division has been the prime goal of the Governing Body of the college since its inception.

The College follows the practice of decentralisation and participative management under the leadership of the principal. This is reflected in the overall functioning of the college. Various committees such as purchase committee, construction committee, Admission committee, Library committee etc, have been constituted under the chairmanship of the Principal.

The college has successfully organised **Golden Jubilee Celebration** with the involvement of the college administration and its stakeholders such as staff members, students, alumni and donors. It reflects the practice of decentralised and participative management.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Our institution is committed to take up such activities to inculcate values in the students so as to make them responsible citizens as clearly stated in its mission, namely to inculcate social, moral, ethical and democratic values among the rural youth through access to Higher Education. Commemorative days of national importance such as Independence Day, National Youth Day, Republic Day, and National Voters' Day are observed with the sole objective of instilling in the students a sense of patriotism and to make them responsible citizens. Two best practices of the college worth-mentioning are examination management and maintenance of green and eco-friendly campus.

Maintenance of eco-friendly environment for sustainable development is indispensable in view of threats and challenges posed to environment due to anthropogenic activities. **Urban plantation, development of Mango orchard, maintenance of college garden enriched with medicinal herbs** endemic to the Gandhamardan range, Bio-composting of organic solid waste are main activities in this regard. It is worth-mentioning that the college has been awarded by the govt of Odisha as the **best performing educational institution for outstanding performance in plantation and afforestation**.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

<p>1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:</p>	<p>Being a multidisciplinary college with enough land available for expansion, it can grow into a large multidisciplinary HEI. The college runs Bachelor of Arts (English, Odia, History, Political Science, Education, Economics, Philosophy), Science (Botany, Chemistry, Math, Physics, Zoology) and Commerce streams. Online Learning Platforms like SWAYAM can be supplemented for remote learning of subject not available in the college. The institution is planning to open Integrated Teacher Education Programme (ITEP) under the department of Education as multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary courses are being run in the college. The institution will also take essential steps for conducting</p>
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	interdisciplinary research/projects at undergraduate level. We are also planning for organizing national and international interdisciplinary seminar on emerging concerns.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The college runs a certificate course, more certificate and diploma courses are to be run in near future. We are encouraging our students to get enrolled in online courses offered by SWAYAM, which will add credits to academic bank of students. We are planning to run some online short-term courses on Life Skills, Human Nutrition, Communication Skills, Personality Development etc. which will add to the academic bank of students.
3. Skill development:	The college runs Bachelor programme in Arts, Science and Commerce stream, so for the skill development of students we are going to run Spoken English course to develop communication skills of students. In science stream also, we are planning to encourage dryland farming and food processing (horticulture). We are also planning for a value-aided courses for skill development of students. We are planning to organize community involvement programme in the college for developing awareness and skills of students regarding the use of technology as a means of earning for livelihood, which will make them self-employed in future. Proper planning is to be made in the college for developing choices of students for vocational trades, preferably need-based and area-specific.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Students of the college are taught by using Indian languages. There is place of teaching culture in the curriculum of undergraduate course. The college encourages students for performing arts. Gandhamardhana hill is nearer to the college campus, so we are planning to run some online courses by inviting experts of Ayurveda for the integration of Indian Knowledge system. We are planning to organise national and international seminar on cross-cultural issues in Indian context.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	At the undergraduate level common CBCS syllabus followed by the college depicts learning outcomes for each paper. In this regard, the college emphasizes assessment of student learning based on the learning outcomes of the paper. Continuous assessment of student progress is done both in online and offline

	<p>mode as per the learning outcomes. Question banks are prepared in each department of the college focusing on the learning outcomes. Efforts are being taken to accomplish the learning objectives and promoting outcome-based education.</p>
6. Distance education/online education:	<p>Our college is the study centre of Indira Gandhi National Open University and Odisha State Open University. Rajborasambar region is known to be economically underdeveloped region in Odisha, so it has been noticed that most of the girl students prefer for higher study in distance mode. Recently UG and PG semester examinations of Odisha State Open University were held in the college, where about 500 students appeared, out of which most of them were girls. So, there is a scope to run distance education programme in the college. Therefore, we are planning to run some certificate and diploma courses through distance education and online education for the benefits of the students, gradually we will plan for offering UG and PG courses in distance mode. Credits earned from Distance / Online courses organized by UGC will add to the credit banks of students.</p>

Objective of the Practice

Unless the students are continuously assessed and examined, imparting of education is incomplete. Further it has the implicit goal of training the impetuous youths to face challenges and accept success and failure with equal ease.

The Practice-

Many a time visitors of high profile have extolled the unique exam system followed and practised by the institution which occupies a coveted place in the academic map of the state.
